Everyone is being discipled. The question is: what is discipling us? The majority of Christians today are being discipled by popular media, flashy events, and folk theology because churches have neglected their responsibility to make disciples. From Franchise to Local Dive explores what it means to multiply ministry by cooking with local flavor.
