Johannesburg is the economic hub of South Africa and the Southern African region. At the same time, it is a city of extremes which juxtaposes ostentatious wealth and conspicuous consumption with grinding poverty and food insecurity. Not enough is known about the prevalence and nature of food insecurity in the city, making it difficult to challenge and plan to reduce the urban food gap. This paper uses AFSUN data from

three lower-income areas of the city (Alexandra, Orange Farm and the Inner City) to examine the characteristics and drivers of food insecurity in Johannesburg. Despite high overall levels of food insecurity, the three study areas exhibited important differences. While the proportion of food secure households was similar in each area, the proportion of severely food insecure households was highest in the informal settlement of Orange Farm and lowest in Alexandra. Household food insecurity is directly linked to household income as the vast majority of food consumed is purchased not grown. In general, the poorer the household, the greater the proportion of household income that is spent on food. Households rely significantly on supermarkets and the informal food economy as food sources. Less than ten percent are involved in any form of urban agriculture or receive food transfers directly from rural areas. This paper also shows that food insecurity correlates with poor health outcomes and concludes with a discussion of the policy implications of the AFSUN study.

Poor dietary quality is a significant risk factor for stunting and micronutrient deficiencies among young children and globally one of the leading causes of premature death and disease (Arimond & Ruel, 2004; Forouzanfar et al., 2015). Dietary quality is typically proxied by diversity of the consumed diet. Foods with similar nutritional qualities are first grouped together and dietary diversity is measured by the number of different food groups consumed in a certain time interval. For example, the World Health Organization recommends that children 6-23 months consume at least four food groups (out of seven) every day. Based on this metric, Ethiopian children in this age range consume one of the least diversified diets in sub-Saharan Africa (Hirvonen, 2016) with only 14 percent meeting the WHO recommendation (CSA & ICF, 2016). Recent analysis of the timing of growth faltering of young children suggests that poor complementary feeding practices, including poor dietary quality, is an important risk factor for stunting in Ethiopia (Hirvonen, Headey, Golan, & Hoddinott, 2019). The available evidence suggests that diets are monotonous also at the household level. For example, in 2011, the average Ethiopian household consumed only 42 kg of fruits and vegetables in a year per adult equivalent (Hassen Worku, Dereje, Minten, & Hirvonen, 2017) – far below the World Health Organization’s recommendation of 146 kg per year (Hall, Moore, Harper, & Lynch, 2009). This report is structured as follows. In the subsequent section, we describe the data used in this report. In section 3, we assess the consumption of nutritious foods among young children and also carry out a similar assessment at the household level. In section 4, we study the production of nutritious foods in the region. In section 5, we examine the availability of nutritious foods in rural markets. In section 6, we assess the affordability of nutritious foods in the region. Section 7 concludes and summarizes the findings.

Abstract: In making informed and educated decisions, logical reasoning is crucial for decision makers and people in everyday life, yet research has shown that people often consistently and systematically fail to reason logically (Wason & Johnson-Laird, 1972).

Contextual factors such as biases, existing beliefs, motivation and emotion have also been shown to have effects on cognition and reasoning (e.g., Blanchette, 2006; Blanchette & Richards, 2004; Ditto & Lopez, 1992; Kunda, 1990; Markovits & Nantel, 1989). The present study examined the impact reading about an emotionally valenced topic (e.g., abortion, gay rights) would have on a person's ability to reach a logical conclusion. It also explored the effect that emotional sentences vs. neutral sentences had on the interpretation of different quantifiers, in particular, whether participants were more accurate reasoning about quantifiers presented through emotionally neutral as opposed to emotionally valenced topics. In Experiment 1, participants read short, emotional or neutral paragraphs, and were asked to reason about the information presented in the paragraphs by responding to logical reasoning questions. Experiment 2 tested the participants' interpretation of the quantifiers all, some, no and some ... are not when encountered in simple sentences about either emotional or neutral topics. Results from Experiment 1 indicated that participants were not significantly more accurate in responding to questions involving logical reasoning when the topic was neutral as opposed to emotional. Further, Experiment 2 did not find a significant effect of emotion; however, there were significant differences in interpretation as a function of the quantifier used. While results did not support our hypothesis, they suggest future areas to explore the effects of emotion and quantifiers in reasoning.

The ultimate goal of this book is to explain that the Grothendieck–Teichmüller group, as defined by Drinfeld in quantum group theory, has a topological interpretation as a group of homotopy automorphisms associated to the little 2-disc operad. To establish this result, the applications of methods of algebraic topology to operads must be developed.
